



Context

Context Section 26 of the Counterterrorism and Security Act 2015 places a duty on certain bodies in the exercise of their functions, to have "due regard to the need to prevent people from being drawn into terrorism". Schools, as a 'specified authority, are expected to assess the risk of children being drawn into terrorism, including support for extremist ideas that are part of terrorist ideology'. This is outlined in the Prevent duty for schools https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/protectingchildren-from-radicalisation-the-prevent-duty
