

English

Today's English is all about commonly confused words. There are many of these in English. Some of the most common are, where, wear, we're and were. People often confuse your and you're as well. Look at the definitions below and then use the sheets on the school website to see if you can use the correct one in each of the sentences.

Where – this one is asking the location of something. You can remember this because it has the word here in it – **where is it?**

Wear – this is when you put something on. **When you go to school you will wear your uniform.**

We're – this is short for we are. We take away the 'a' and the space and replace them with the apostrophe. **We're enjoying the lovely weather.**

Were – this is the past tense of the word are. **We were enjoying the lovely weather last week.**

Your – this means it belongs to you. **This is your learning for today**

You're – this is short for you are. We take away the 'a' and the space and replace them with the apostrophe. **You're enjoying the lovely weather.**
